AmeriCorps paid off the offset costs to enable Malaiah to pay for her education. By graduating it gave her structure and a sense of belonging.



House of Trades Projects



CLARION FAMILY THERAPY PAINTING PROJECT

The House of Trades team along with AmeriCorps serving from other other host sites came together to paint the new office and therapy spaces for Clarion Family Therapy. This project took place over 8 days with 6-10 members and 1-2 staff members each day. An estimated 336 hours were spent on this project. The beneficiaries of this project will be 1,900 clients and 21 staff of Clarion Family Therapy

The House of Trades team is currently collaborating with Zion Education Center to turn a house purchase by Zion into an infant and toddler center. This project thus far has consisted of cleaning everything out of the house, surveying existing gas and water lines, dealing with safety issues so they can safely work on the demolition of old water, gas and electric lines, painting and labeling the line in the basement for easy identification. Members are not only helping to complete this project to create a safe place for the infant and toddlers, but they are also learning very valuable trades that they can use in the future.
